Vision/Values

The new school vision was created in consultation with all stakeholders, which included an INSET day with staff and governors, meetings with the Senedd and a questionnaire shared with the community. The school vision will be launched in September 2022 and underpins all areas of school life.

The curriculum was developed in consultation with stakeholders. This included staff CPD, reading and research, all staff considering the learners needs and the school context related to the four purposes. Surveys for governors, staff, parents and pupils considering pupils' knowledge, skills and experiences and which values they should develop during their time at the school. The school is in the early stages of curriculum

design and is adopting the process to develop a curriculum that is suitable for all learners.
